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Dear Caring Community,

The Trust is asking for your help to save precious habitat for Gang gangs and Powerful Owls

Beecroft and Cheltenham flora and fauna is under threat from heartbreaking removal of habitat due to ETTT, NWRL and 10/50 legislation. We need to hold on to what we have and stop these losses.

Byles Creek Valley is now in danger. The Hornsby Shire Council is considering a 5 property subdivision of privately owned land in a precious wildlife corridor linking the Lane Cove National Park and Pennant Hills Park. The required "Bushfire Asset Protection Zone" will result in the clearing for perpetuity (never allowed to regrow) of more than one hectare of precious bushland (in addition to the proposed buildings)

This is bushland that will be lost forever.

The Trust and Byles Creek Valley Union and the Community have been lobbying the State and Local Governments to acquire this Byles Creek Valley Land. Unfortunately recent indications are that the State Government is not prepared to assist.

The Trust believes that if the local community shows a willingness to contribute towards the acquisition, this may influence the decision of the Government to do likewise. Please help our threatened flora and fauna. Please pledge what you can, no matter how little, to save this beautiful asset for perpetuity.

There is already government money

which could and should be used for the community. Hornsby Council has resolved that the proceeds of the sale of the former Congregational church will go towards community facilities, such as open space, in Beecroft and Cheltenham. In addition the State Government has a huge windfall bonus of stamp duty from new developments and council has section 94 contributions from developers which must be spent on community facilities and services.

We need to show the government that we as a community value our heritage, are willing to support it and they need to act accordingly.

Which is the real classic?

See if you can spot the differences between 19th century artist, Frederick McCubbin's classic paintings of the Australian bush and photos of our very own threatened Byle's Creek Valley trees. Beecroft Pedestrian Bridge – a bridge too far?



A bridge proposal with two lifts, that may help about 100 children each school-day, is ahead on the NSW Government's priorities to the urgently needed single lift at Beecroft Station - used by 100's of people every weekday. It seems a sad example of one-sizefits-all government. The Beecroft Road proposed bridge linking the primary school and Village Green is a fair copy of one at Heathcote, linking its rail station to the shopping centre. The Trust does not oppose a bridge and acknowledges it is a good road safety project. However, reflecting resident concerns, the Trust sees a Beecroft Station lift being a higher priority - with a greater community benefit

Your Trust has written to NSW MP Damien Tudehope:

"...reflecting local resident experience and concerns, the Trust supports the decision to build a pedestrian bridge across Beecroft Road. But it has serious reservations that the location of the pedestrian bridge is not ideal for optimising local pedestrian use and safety requirements. The children's and other local resident users' safety must be paramount and any bridge must be located in such a position to encourage $\,$ them to use it. Otherwise, as noted by many experienced residents [including those at our Annual General Meeting, which you kindly attended], we assert this bridge's relatively isolated location will make it a 'white elephant' insufficiently patronised to justify its construction cost."

Cheltenham Station – Kiss & Ride ... and walk & walk?

Whilst the current drop-off area for commuters (kiss and ride) adjacent to platform 1 at Cheltenham has limited space – it has always worked well for last-minute access for city-bound commuters. The proposed kiss and ride in the Crescent on the right hand side of the second photo below will not serve city commuters well and will require around a two minute walk to get to platform 1, 2 or new 3. Is that the kind of progress NSW Government is about?

NSW Government & Hornsby Council fail to save 140-year-old iconic tree to development...

Despite wet cold weather, residents turned up to mark the loss of a huge 140 year old native White Mahogany tree. Channel 7 News highlighted it, as did ABC 702 Radio's Linda Mottram. Yesterday's tree becomes Today's stump...

A prominent resident emailed your Trust:

"So much for the title 'The Bushland Shire'. So much for the protection of 'tree species indigenous to the Shire' that Council lists shall be preserved. So much for the 'Threatened Species Conservation Acts' related to Blue Gum High Forest canopy species. So much for landscape amenity, habitat value, songbirds and the enjoyment of a shady tree in summer.

A grand old tree that stood strong and upright against all weather events, whose bones were a solid to the end, with not a blemish in that heart wood. 140 years to grow (1,226,400 hours) – 10 hours to destroy."


