# BEECROFT CHELTENHEM HISTORY GROUP REPORT 1990.

The twelve members of the group have had an active year pursuing the fascinating story of the birt fortunate to have as members of the group senior office bearers the Hornsby Shire Historical Society the group senior office bearers. the Hornsby Shire Historical Society, the Royal Australian Historical Society and the Society. Historical Society and the Society of Australian Genealogists.

"The Book" is the main long term object of our endeavours, the first volume of which is planned to cover the history of Beecroft-Cheltenham Cheltenham to 1914. Areas of interset being researched are:

1. The eraly inhabitants to 1850.

2. Opening up the Field of Mars Common 1850 - 1890.

3. The Growth of Beecroft Village 1890 - 1900.

4. Early Families 1887 - 1907.

5. Village Life and Activities 1900 - 1914.

6. Special ares such as School of Arts, local schools and early churches.

A notable feature of the year was the publication by the group of A Sure B-"A Sure Foundation", a monagraph describing the first six years of the history of St John's Anglican Church, Beecroft, to coincide with the centenary of St John's Anglican Church, Beecroft, to combine the centenary of that church. Copies have sold well and a limited number are still available at three dollars each. An exhibition of historical manufacture of the statement of the historical material was held at St John's during the centenary weekend weekend and was well attended. Preliminary discussions have taken place core place concerning a local history workbook for school children.

Our fund raising efforts towards the cost of publication have been continued by the cost of publication have been conti continued by an enthusiastic group of supporters. A Cheltenham historical walk was held (in the rain), a musical afternoon took place, a Christian (forced mementos relating to the distriction). place, a Christmas stall offered mementos relating to the district including including a new edition of the Beecroft tea towel. The shopping basket with the words "I'm an old bag from Beecroft" also sold well.
